NIH Names Dr. Raynard S. Kington Acting Director of NIAAA

NIH appointed Raynard S. Kington, M.D., Ph.D., as acting director of the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) last month. His appointment follows the retirement of Enoch Gordis, M.D., who had led NIAAA for 15 years.

Dr. Kington previously served as NIH associate director for behavioral and social sciences research and as director of the NIH Office of Behavioral and Social Sciences Research. He will retain these positions while serving as NIAAA acting director.

Prior to joining NIH in 2000, Dr. Kington served as director of the Division of Health Examination Statistics for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in its National Center for Health Statistics. There, he led the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, a comprehensive, ongoing survey of the health status, health behaviors, and diet of Americans.

Dr. Kington holds board certifications in internal, geriatric, and public health and preventive medicine. His research has focused on social factors as determinants of health: the role of socioeconomic status in explaining differences in health across populations, the determinants of health care services utilization, the health status and health behaviors of Hispanic populations, and the economic impact of health care expenditures among the elderly.

Dr. Kington received his undergraduate and medical degrees from the University of Michigan and earned his M.B.A. and Ph.D. from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania.

NHLBI Stresses Heart Attack Education

Only one in five heart attack patients gets to the hospital in time to receive life-saving treatment. Fast action, especially within the first hour of symptoms, can save lives and limit damage to the heart.

The National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI), in partnership with the American Heart Association, has launched a new campaign called “Act in Time to Heart Attack Signs.” The campaign encourages people to recognize heart attack symptoms, work with physicians to create survival plans, and call 911 as soon as symptoms begin. The most common warning signs are:

- pain or discomfort in the center of the chest;
- discomfort in one or both arms or in the back, neck, jaw, or stomach;
- shortness of breath; and
- other signs, such as breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea, or lightheadedness.

New Rules for Snow Removal in Montgomery County

The first major snowstorms of the season may have missed Montgomery County, but when it does snow a lot, homeowners will have to clear the sidewalks or face a fine.



A new law requires Montgomery County homeowners to clear the *public* sidewalks in front of their homes within 24 hours of a snowfall. Residents must clear a path wide enough for safe pedestrian and wheelchair use. If residents find it extremely difficult to clear the ice or snow, they can use salt, sand, or other abrasives. Violators will receive a warning, then a \$50 fine. Residents do not have to clear private drives or walkways. The purpose of law is to keep pedestrians from having to

walk in the street with traffic after a snowstorm. Some County municipalities, including Rockville and Takoma Park, already have similar laws in place.

CASA of Maryland has agreed to help County residents who are unable to clear their sidewalks. CASA will provide workers for an approximate cost of \$25 per house. Larger lots may cost more. If you need assistance, call 301-431-4185.

Bethesda Library Closes for Renovations


